Homeless... Sick...and at Death's Door

You Helped Save Parvo Positive Pups from a Grim Fate

Luther, King, and May transferred to AWA so they would not be euthanized. They were diagnosed with parvovirus - a highly contagious and life-threatening disease. They were so ill and lethargic, you could see the sadness in their eyes. They came from a shelter that struggles with disease control and treatment options for the hundreds of animals that come through their doors. We asked you, our kind donors, to help save these precious pups, and you did.

Parvovirus mostly affects puppies and unvaccinated dogs and still remains a scary disease to have surface in our shelter. Because of its extremely transmittable nature, it puts enormous strain on a shelter in all stages of care including safe

transport, an extended period of isolation, round-the-clock monitoring, fluids and medication, and an additional recovery time before the pup is ready for adoption. Within our old building, treatment and quarantine are especially difficult. Yet, we manage.

With your support and the tenacity of the AWA team, all three parvo positive puppies are now healthy and thriving. Luther, May, and King have all been adopted and are happy in their new homes.

Thank you for giving them a second chance and for giving AWA the chance to reach out and save animals in our community.

Thank you so much to our donors and all of the animals' rescuers and friends. Because of you, we helped over 21,000 animals in 2017!

Dear Friends,

Sit down. Put your "barking dogs" up. I guarantee your heart will warm and your lips will curve up in a wonderful smile as your read our many happy stories. This spring's newsletter is the perfect antidote to March's Nor'easters.

For more than seventy years, AWA has been a vital part of the community rescuing, aiding and saving pets and people. The community is more

humane because of the broad and effective programs AWA has delivered year-after-year. AWA has made SJ safer for animals by delivering relevant programs each decade. Most recently, we focused our efforts on pet over-population and spayed/neutered over 5,000 outdoor cats and 2,500 of pets in the City of Camden. The impact was that there was a significant decline in the number of cats and dogs going into our two municipal animal shelters. Creating space in those shelters means less euthanizing for space!



Recently we took in several parvo positive pups. Many years ago it was considered a "dream" to treat parvo virus in puppies due to the grim chances of survival and how contagious the illness is to other dogs. Even today a diagnosis of parvo makes us nervous, yet we are able to diagnosis the illness earlier and provide care so we can celebrate their survival and subsequent placement into new, loving homes.

As more animals are being saved at our local municipal shelters, AWA has been able to save dogs and cats outside our community through our transport program. Often we say "he or she is transported to us" but what does that mean when it comes to your donation? In just the last seven months, AWA's team has taken 50 trips totaling over 2,486 miles to bring back over 230 dogs and 187 cats to our Adoption Center. Many of these dogs and cats needed extra medical and behavioral care. Our behavior team provided hundreds of hours of special behavior rehabilitation and our veterinary team provided treatments for heartworm, skin infections, eye issues, and broken bones - conditions that would have led to euthanasia if they didn't hitch a transport ride to AWA. Transport saves lives!

On our last page, we will walk you through our transport journey from early morning pick ups to happy adoption. Learn how we directly use your gifts to save lives from shelters near and far to save pets like Luther, King, and May.



- Pet Therapy


AWA is a private charity and receives no local, state, or federal support. No animal is euthanized due to space, length of stay or for treatable medical or behavioral issues.

You Help Save Our Most Needy Pets



From a shelter in hurricane-hit Houston to a loving home in South Jersey. Harvey on his way to his forever home.

The 2017 hurricane season was especially devastating. The impact included hundreds of pets being displaced from homes in Texas, Florida, and Puerto Rico. Because of you, AWA was there to help. AWA took in dozens of animals from shelters from the affected areas to make room for pets that were separated from their families during the storm. The AWA staff were so proud and touched by the outpouring of support from our community. The phone did not stop ringing with people calling to see how they could help! We also received hundreds of supplies that we were able to share with other shelters in need.

Harvey was one of the first dogs we brought in from a shelter in Houston. He would have most likely been euthanized to make much needed space for displaced pets. He was suffering from skin allergies, an ear infection, and kennel cough. After medical care, Harvey got a clean bill of health and is now healthy and a beloved member of an adoring family. A family member writes: "We couldn't have asked for a better addition to our family. I can't express enough how much we love him and could not imagine life without him."

Who Would Shoot a Helpless Cat?





Tom was transferred from a local shelter with what we thought was a fractured leg. It's not that uncommon for homeless cats to have leg fractures - they fall, get hit by cars, etc. That's why we were shocked when x-rays showed that Tom's leg contained bullet fragments and his ankle was completely shattered. Who would shoot such a sweet cat? Was it a hunting accident? Was it on purpose? We will never know. Tom was rushed to surgery and our vet team amputated his leg to save his life. His surgery went well and he is now recovering. Even in pain, Tom is such an affectionate cat. Once he is ready to be placed, we will find him the loving home he deserves. A shelter can be a stressful environment for any dog, especially one who cannot hear. When he came to AWA. he was anxious and out of sorts, and it became obvious

that he would have a rough time adapting. Our behavior team worked one-on-one with Patch, giving him special enrichment and plenty of time outside of his kennel. His special needs required an experienced owner. Then one day, it happened! A woman in our community heard his story and came in to meet him. She had experience with dogs, taught hearing impaired children and even knew dog sign language! It was love at first sight and she knew Patch was the perfect dog for her!

Staff at our **Pet Clinic** are always busy with spay/neuter surgeries, vaccine clinics, wellness exams, workshops, and more. Our lost-cost wellness and spay/neuter clinic keeps pets in our community healthy and controls pet overpopulation. In 2017:

6,958 pets helped through vaccine clinics

8,081 spay/ neuters performed

Why We Need Support from Animal Lovers Like You

Transport saves lives! As more animals are being saved at our local municipal shelters, AWA has been able to save dogs and cats outside our community through our transport program.

Just in the last seven months, AWA did a total of 72 transports. AWA made 50 trips and traveled 2,486 miles. We drove as far as Allentown to pick up homeless pets and we drive to airports to pick up unwanted pets from the south that would be euthanized for space. Transport costs AWA around \$130,000 annually. Your gifts help pets and other shelters' animals both near and far. Below is the journey that these pets make from transport to adoption. Your donations make a direct impact!
