Dear Friends,

As we reflect on 2024, it's clear that this year has been one of remarkable growth, profound impact, and unwavering dedication to our mission of eliminating animal suffering, promoting the human-animal bond, and improving the well-being of our community. Thanks to your support, AWA has reached new heights in creating a compassionate and caring environment for animals and people alike.

This year, we introduced innovative programs and expanded our existing services to address the ever-evolving needs of our community. Our spay/neuter and wellness clinics provided thousands of affordable surgeries and veterinary services, ensuring that pets in South Jersey received the care they deserve. Through our Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) program, we performed 1,073 surgeries in 2024—an incredible increase from 320 in 2023. Our Vets on Wheels (VOW) program in Camden also experienced growth, serving 1,561 pets in 2024 compared to 1,159 in 2023. In addition, we saw a 50% increase in the number of animals placed in foster care compared to 2023.

Adoptions also reached a historic milestone, with over 1,000 more animals finding loving homes than in 2022. Through these efforts, we continue to ensure that every pet has the opportunity for a brighter future.

Our education initiatives also saw tremendous growth in 2024. With the introduction of empathy education for grades 2-4 and a STEM-focused curriculum for older students, we inspired the next generation of animal

advocates. The success of our free STEM Education Day at the shelter and the launch of our re-branded "Operation Compassion" program underscored the transformative power of education in fostering a more compassionate future.

Every achievement this year has been made possible because of you. Whether you adopted a pet, volunteered your time, attended an event, or supported us financially, your compassion has fueled our success. Together, we've made a difference for countless animals and the people who love them.

As we look to 2025, we remain committed to pushing boundaries, expanding our reach, and ensuring that no animal or family is left behind. With your continued partnership, we can build on this year's successes and bring even more hope and healing to South Jersey.

On behalf of the entire team at AWA, thank you for being an integral part of our journey. Together, we're creating a brighter future for animals and the people who care for them.

Financial Health

AWA's financial position remains sound and stable. Program Revenue increased by 26% with the continued growth in Shelter, Clinic, and Education programs.

The cost to operate has also increased with continued inflation. Main expense drivers include a 16% increase in drugs and medicines, 33% increase in Clinic and Shelter supplies, 37% increase in merchant & payment processing fees, and 26% increase in utilities.

83.8% of expenses were directed to AWA's life saving programs for animals and our community.

In 2024, charitable bequests and investment income allowed AWA to pay off the outstanding balance of the construction loan and cover an operating deficit.

VETS ON WHEELS

AWA's Vets on Wheels (VOW) is a valuable outreach program that provides basic preventative healthcare to pets in the City of Camden. By addressing transportation and financial barriers faced by pet owners, the program ensures that more pets receive the care they need to stay healthy and protected.

Services offered to pet owners: Distemper, Rabies, and Bordetella vaccines, deworming, flea and tick preventatives, microchipping or microchip check.

FERAL FIX-IT PROGRAM

AWA set out in 2024 to spay/neuter 1,000 community cats through our Feral Fix-it program. Imagine the excitement when not only did we reach 1,000 but surpassed it with 73 additional cats, a 235% increase over the previous year. We knew it was an ambitious endeavor, but the importance of providing these affordable services to community cat caregivers is essential to keeping colony cats healthy and helping to reduce the number of unwanted kittens born each year.

FOSTER VOLUNTEERS

Foster volunteers play a vital role in saving the lives of shelter animals. By opening their homes to animals in need, they provide a safe and loving environment where pets can heal, grow, and prepare for their forever homes. Many animals, especially young kittens and puppies, those recovering from illness or surgery, or pets who struggle in a shelter environment, benefit immensely from the individualized care and comfort that only a foster home can provide.

Without foster volunteers, shelters often struggle with overcrowding, which can lead to stress and illness among animals. By fostering, volunteers help free up space and resources, allowing shelters to take in more animals in need. Additionally, foster caregivers provide valuable insights into an animal's personality, helping adoption coordinators match pets with the perfect families.

Shaping Future Animal Advocates

EDUCATION AT AWA

AWA's Education Department plays a pivotal role in shaping the future of animal welfare, fostering empathy, and empowering communities with the knowledge to make a positive impact. Through hands-on programs, community outreach, and awareness campaigns, we aim to build a more compassionate world for both animals and humans. In 2024 we were able to expand our summer camps to 10 weeks and add a few new programs.

FAMILY FUN DAY

On July 13th, we hosted our second Family Fun Day, a free community event designed to raise awareness for AWA. The event was a tremendous success, drawing over 300 attendees, including families and children. Kids had a blast with interactive activities like pet-themed crafts, face painting, and a special visit from Bluey. In addition to the fun, we raised hundreds of dollars through donations and merchandise sales. The event not only showcased our mission but also brought the community together in a fun, family-friendly environment, while helping to raise awareness and support for animal welfare.

STEM PROGRAM

Our STEM Day, began as a community event and has blossomed into a dynamic, traveling program that now reaches our entire local area. This year, our STEM Program visited more than five schools, bringing interactive, two-hour lessons directly to students. By exploring the fascinating ways animals are connected to STEM, we've introduced children to fields like veterinary science, animal engineering, animal nutrition, and animal behavior. Through these engaging, hands-on experiences, students are able to immerse themselves in the world of animals, discovering how science and technology help in understanding and caring for them.

From Homeless to Home

HOMES FOR THREE KITTENS

Marco, Polo, and Frost affectionately known as AWA's "Sewer Cats" were born into a community cat colony at a local water reservoir; these resilient felines have faced adversity head-on.

Upon arriving at AWA, they brought with them severe skin issues that puzzled our medical team for months. Despite consulting with experts, including a pathology specialist the cause remains elusive. Determined to help them, these brave kittens were placed in isolation and the medical team embarked on a rigorous treatment regimen. Among the many challenges they faced, was combating a highly-resistant bacteria known as MRSP, which fortunately was cleared with antibiotics.

Marco and Polo found their forever home together in just over a month, while Frost needed a bit more time. She stayed at AWA for nearly six months before finding her perfect match. Now, her pet parents share that she's thriving in her new home, where she's pictured in the top photo alongside her new sibling. Her skin condition continues to improve, and with each passing day she grows more confident and outgoing.



A NEW LIFE OF LOVE FOR GINNY

Ginny, a brave and resilient dog, was among over 400 dogs rescued from a harrowing hoarding situation. These dogs endured months of neglect and overcrowding before being removed from this life-threatening environment.

Although Ginny was being well-cared for at the rescue group where she was staying, she wasn't catching the eye of potential adopters. She waited a whole year, and still, for reasons hard to understand, she hadn't found a forever home. Coming to AWA would increase her chances of getting adopted.

AWA's behavior team noted that Ginny was displaying behavior indicting of stress, which considering all she had been through, was normal. Fortunately, AWA has wonderful foster volunteers who can provide a calm and nurturing temporary home, so pets like Ginny can relax, learn how to play, and experience the love of a family, sometimes for the first time.

Ginny was fortunate to spend some time with a loving foster family before she made the transition to her own forever home.




Saving Lives Beyond Our Doors

RESCUING CATS AFTER THE STORM

This past August, when we were asked to help cats and kittens in Iowa affected by catastrophic flooding, we responded affirmatively and brought 39 cats and kittens to AWA, thanks to the strong backing from our donors.

Transporting these cats not only helped alleviate overcrowding in shelters impacted by the flooding, which were also caring for owned pets of families in recovery, but it also gave shelter cats a better chance of finding forever homes. After a disaster, shelter intakes rise while adoptions drop, illustrating the importance of AWA's transport program in saving lives.

These felines traveled a long way, flying from Sioux Falls, Iowa, to Atlantic City, New Jersey, before taking a road trip to AWA. Many of these cats and kittens needed more than just vaccines or spay/neuter surgery; they required additional medical care. Fortunately, AWA's compassionate and skilled medical team was ready to help. Our devoted foster volunteers welcomed many of these cats and kittens into their homes, providing them with a safe and peaceful space to recover and heal. Thirty-nine felines found their forever homes through AWA.



PROJECT GIT-MEOW

From April 14–20, AWA's Executive Director, Laura Houston, volunteered with Project Git-Meow to manage the cat population at Naval Station Guantanamo Bay (GBNB), Cuba. In five intense days, the team converted an old restaurant into a temporary clinic, trapping, neutering/spaying, vaccinating, and releasing 375 community cats.

Guantanamo Bay's warm climate and lack of natural predators have led to an unchecked feral cat population, making this project vital for ecological balance. The team also provided free veterinary care to non-military residents.

Living in tents and working 14- to 15-hour days, volunteers from the U.S. and Canada came together with a shared mission. The local community's support was inspiring, showing their deep care for these cats. AWA is proud to have contributed to this impactful effort alongside an incredible team.

HELPING HOMELESS PETS IN NEW MEXICO

AWA's Dr. Emily traveled to New Mexico to be a part of the Soul Dog Rescue's spay/neuter clinic. Surgery was set up in the recreational center at a local reservation with a total of 108 animals (90% dogs) spayed or neutered. Also, several puppies that were found dumped on the side of the road received their surgeries. The team was bare bones but worked great together. Dr. Emily returned in December 2024 to assist at a different spay/neuter clinic local to this area. This work is vital in helping to control the pet population and reduce the number of homeless pets.
