HAPPILY EVER AFTER: TALES OF NEW BEGINNINGS

TWO STARS FIND THEIR HOMES

John Wayne and Clint Eastwood, two inseparable Australian Shepherds, arrived at AWA in September. Just two years old, these energetic herding dogs needed plenty of enrichment to stay happy and healthy, both mentally and physically. They loved romping around the dog yards together or simply relaxing side by side in their shared kennel.

Being in a new and unfamiliar shelter environment made both boys anxious. To help them cope, AWA's Behavior Team developed personalized behavior modification plans tailored to each dog's unique needs. John Wayne was the more outgoing of the duo, while Clint Eastwood tended to be more cautious, often hanging back in the kennel and letting John take the lead.

After a few months, the team realized the best chance for them to find loving homes would be to help them grow more independent. With gentle introductions to other shelter dogs through walks and playgroups, John and Clint slowly learned to build confidence apart from each other. It was recommended that each be adopted into a home with another canine companion to help them feel secure.

After 136 days for John Wayne and 139 days for Clint Eastwood at AWA, their happy endings finally arrived. Both found wonderful forever homes where they continue to thrive. Clint Eastwood now delights in zoomies, rolling in the grass, and endless outdoor play. John Wayne loves nothing more than chasing a squeaky ball with his new dog sibling by his side.

The entire AWA team and volunteers were overjoyed to see these sweet boys, who simply needed extra time and care, to find the loving homes they deserved.

A TALE OF TWO FELINES

FINDING A LOVING HOME

Two cats arrived at AWA on the same December day in 2024—though their journeys there were very different. Twincie was just four months old, full of energy and curiosity. Bagel, a little over a year old, was sweet but extremely timid. During her intake, staff noted that Bagel was clearly frightened. To help her feel safe, she was moved to a quiet office in the Development Department. For weeks, she stayed hidden in her cozy hut, peeking out just enough to show half her face. But with patience, love, and gentle encouragement, Bagel slowly began to come out of her shell, gaining confidence one step at a time.

Twincie, on the other hand, was outgoing and



welcomed attention from the moment he arrived. But behind his playful demeanor was a serious medical issue. Twincie was diagnosed with a rare and complex condition called Peritoneopericardial Diaphragmatic Hernia. In a healthy cat, the heart sits in a protective sac within the chest, with the diaphragm separating the chest from the abdomen. Twincie's protective sac never formed, and his diaphragm was underdeveloped allowing his abdominal organs to move into his chest cavity.

Despite the severity of the condition, Twincie showed no immediate signs of distress. Because he was stable, AWA's medical team had time to research surgical techniques, potential complications, and create a detailed pain management plan. The surgery was a success, and Twincie amazed everyone with his resilience. Just two hours after the procedure, he was already showing interest in

food. He faced a strict recovery period with cage rest and pain management, but his fighting spirit never wavered.

What makes this story truly heartwarming is what happened next: Twincie and Bagel, each with their own challenges, not only found care and healing at AWA—they found each other. Today, they are living happily as siblings in the same forever home.

Thanks to your support, these two deserving cats got the second chance they needed—and found a lifetime of love together.



EDUCATING FOR A KINDER FUTURE



COMPASSIONATE CLASSROOM

We are thrilled to celebrate the completion of another year of our **Animal Academy Home-school** Program! Throughout the year, our students explored a wide range of animal-related topics, including Veterinary Science, the differences between endangered and extinct species, and the impact of pollution on wildlife. These young learners engaged in meaningful discussions, hands-on activities, and interactive lessons that helped deepen their understanding of animals and the natural world. We're already looking forward to another exciting year when the program resumes in September!

EDUCATION IN ACTION

On April 5th, we had the opportunity to participate in the Pennsauken Animal Hospital's Open House, where we set up our always-popular Pretend Pet Clinic. Children stepped into the shoes of veterinarians and technicians, learning about daily animal care and getting a behind-thescenes look at the important work the hospital staff does every day. On April 6th, we wrapped things up with a STEM Day for students ages 11–13. Participants dove into the fascinating world of Animal Science through hands-on experiments and critical thinking activities designed to spark curiosity and a love of learning about animals.

Our **Summer Camp** kicked off on June 23rd, at full capacity! This 10week program runs six hours a day and offers an immersive, behind-thescenes look at shelter life. Campers learn about animal rescue, rehabilitation, and the day-to-day operations of running an animal shelter—all while enjoying games, crafts, and lots of time with furry friends. It's one of our most in-demand programs and a highlight of the year for both kids and staff.
